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This year, the Duke of Edinburgh Award group had two years of students to train and supervise due to the 2020 plans having to be postponed due to the pandemic. We

were also unable to camp overnight in order to ensure the safety of the students, supervisors and members of the public, which is a great shame as I know this is one of the most popular parts of the expedition section. The 2020 groups completed their expeditions in June, with 19 students in 4 groups completing routes in the fells all around Kirkby Stephen. The weather was very pleasant and I think everyone enjoyed the weekend. Training for the second group started in September with a packed programme trying to complete all the

Training for the second group started in September with a packed programme trying to complete all the training in time for the expedition weekend at the end of October. It appeared we were going to be lucky, as the weather for all the training was mild and even warm on occasions with just a little rain on one of the fell practice days, but come the expedition weekend, the students were really tested. Strong winds and heavy showers, particularly on the Sunday, tested their resolve and navigation abilities, but they all managed really well, and arrived back at the Mountain Rescue base at the end of the day, smiling and proud of their achievements.

In some ways, an expedition in challenging conditions can make you feel you've achieved more than one during warm dry weather, and all the supervisors and assessors were very impressed with how everyone coped and their positive attitude.

Plans for 2022 are well underway, with a new group having signed up for the Bronze award, and two Gold groups are also making their plans for expeditions further afield in July.

We hope to be able to return to a more normal training schedule and include camping as well, providing local restrictions allow us.

Dear Parents, carers and students,

So we approach the end of another partially disrupted term under the shadow of the Covid pandemic. We experienced a significant number of positive cases in September and early October. Then it settled down up to half-term. Since the beginning of November we have had a steady number of cases across all year groups and amongst teaching staff. Whilst this has presented us with some difficulties, we have been able to maintain the curriculum partly because the change in the Covid regulations has meant that we haven't had to send whole year groups or classes home.

Therefore, on balance, I regard this as being a largely successful term in which most students have attended school most of the time and subject curricula and lessons have been delivered in a relatively normal way because teachers are teaching in their own classrooms again. We have increasingly been able to offer extra-curricular activities, host visitors and run trips, as you can see from the content of the newsletter.

Lunchtime sports practices have been very well attended from Monday to Wednesday by all year groups. Sports fixtures have also been reintroduced after there being virtually none last year. We are not quite back to the level of pre-Covid fixtures but have managed to offer them in a wide range of sports and activities for all year groups and both genders.

The Duke of Edinburgh Awards Scheme has re-started with healthy numbers in the silver and bronze groups. Thanks, as usual, go to Mr Heys, for his in-school co-ordination, Mike Sunderland for his continued commitment as a volunteer activity leader with the silver group, and Adrian Cottrell of the Mountain Rescue team, for both his co-ordination and leadership of the bronze group. Without their huge contributions Duke of Edinburgh would be in jeopardy. However, I have just met with the regional director for DofE in the North West to try to secure the future of DofE in school. In fact, she and her team have asked us to run a pilot scheme that they are developing called DofE Young Leaders because they are impressed with the way it operates through school. I will tell you more about this in the New Year.

Our students have taken place in a variety of competitions and group activities, such as *The Royal Mail's* iChild Heroes Stamp Design Competition, and the My Time Art Competition with great success. I was particularly impressed by the KSGS Lockdown Anthology of poetry and prose writings which was curated by the English department.

We have also focused on important world and national events in school such as Cop26, National Anti-Bullying Week and the CEASE Youth Programme. These are all incredibly important issues for young people and it is a testament to the dedication of the staff leading these activities that they have found time to organise them whilst managing the uncertain landscape of day-to-day teaching during the pandemic. I would like to thank all of the staff for their unceasing commitment to the school and our students.

Finally, I would like to thank the students for their cooperation and support during this term. We know that we are lucky to work with and for such excellent young people, a fact that we are reminded of whenever we take students out on activities or have visitors in school.

I wish you all a Happy Christmas and New Year and fervently hope that it is peaceful and Covid-free.

Year 11 Geography FieldworkAs part of the Geography GCSE Year 11 undertook some fieldwork along the River Eden. We worked with the Eden Rivers Trust who helped us understand how the river changes as it travels downstream and some of the work they are doing to create more biodiversity within the river prevent future flood events further downstream.

We started off at Hellgill Waterfall near the source of the River Eden, then moved onto Franks Bridge and finished off at Lazonby.

Students measured the depth and width of the river (lots of wet feet!) and how fast it was flowing – this involved measuring how long a dog biscuit took to travel down a 5 metre stretch of river (they didn't get very far at Franks Bridge as the ducks were more than happy to intervene!) Students learned how to conduct fieldwork and now have a really good idea of how the river changes as it travels downstream through our communities. Art competition success This year all students in years 7 to 9 were given the opportunity to enter the Royal Mail's iChild Heroes Stamp Design Competition. Students at KSGS were given the opportunity to design a stamp in their art lessons to enter the competition.

Congratulations to all the children at our school who entered, as their designs contributed towards a GUINNESS WORLD RECORDS™ title for the largest postage stamp design competition! An incredible 606,049 entries were received by the competition organisers, from children across the UK, with an amazing 7,479 schools taking part. Prime Minister Boris Johnson said: "It is of great credit to the children of this country that in world record breaking numbers they picked up their paintbrushes, pens and paints and paid artistic tribute to the heroes of our coronavirus response. Their brilliant efforts represent the collective gratitude of the nation to everyone who went above and beyond during the pandemic. Congratulations to all those who have made it to the next round and thank you to everyone who has taken part."

The entries were whittled down to 120 regional finalists by a network of judges consisting of current and retired art teachers who evaluated each of the 606,049 entries over a three-month period, the best entries from Northern Ireland, Scotland, Wales and the nine regions of England were chosen from each age group. You can see these final 120 entries on the competition website, including the entry from our own regional finalist Bicci Clark in Year 9

An important message about Testicular Cancer

On Tuesday 12th October all Year 9 and 10 students attended an assembly presentation by Robbie Wilmot from the Oddballs Foundation. The OddBalls Foundation was founded in 2016 to raise awareness of Testicular Cancer. Through the Foundation they hope to make a difference to male health around the world.



One of the main ways they deliver their message is through their University Ambassador scheme. The Ambassadors visit schools, universities and workplaces, delivering talks on Testicular Cancer; reminding boys and men to check themselves — and removing any stigma and embarrassment about it.

Testicular Cancer is around 95% curable so early diagnosis and regular checking is important. The foundation's aim is to fit 'check yourself' guides into male toilets and changing rooms across the country, encouraging males to check themselves regularly and in doing so detect any problems early. We at KSGS have installed 'check yourself' guides in our male toilets to remind our students of this important message.



MyTime Art competition finalist

In the summer term students in Year 9 were given the opportunity, during art lessons, to enter a competition to design a new logo for the MyTime Cumbria service which is part of Barnardo's.

MyTime is an emotional and wellbeing service who support children and young people who are experiencing emotional health issues such as anger, anxiety, low mood, self-harm and depression.

The countywide competition asked students to design a logo in black and white featuring the words 'Barnardo's, MyTime Cumbria Service" and an appropriate logo image.

There were three runners up from KSGS who received certificates. The overall finalist for the region was KSGS student Isabel Hastwell who received a hamper of prizes presented in an upper school assembly by Amy Armstrong, the MyTime representative. Well done to all who entered. Suzie Wealleans

Kirkby Stephen Grammar School Summer School ran from Monday 2nd of August to Friday 6th August.

These subjects included design and technology, art, drama, and history. The students made a range of Roman equipment including shields, catapults and ballistae. NATIONAL ANTI-BULLYING WEEK 15th-19th November 2021

To mark National Anti-Bullying week KSGS students were reminded of the impact bullying can have on individuals and how to access help or advice should they become the victims of bullying themselves, or know of someone

During form time students watched an assembly presentation and video made by the Anti-Bullying Alliance, which had the slogan 'One Kind Word' as its main theme. The message from the video was: In a world that can sometimes feel like it's filled with negativity, one kind word can provide a moment of hope. It can be a turning point. It can change the course of a conversation and break the cycle of bullying. Best of all, one kind word leads to another. Kindness fuels kindness.

As part of their Personal Development studies, all Year 7 and 8 students worked either individually or in small groups to produce a piece of art work centred around the 'One Kind Word' theme. These art works have been sent to Carlisle Library where they will contribute to a large 'paste up' art installation, which will then be moved around Cumbria throughout the year to spread the anti-bullying message.

Year 7 students Jessica Diggle and Poppie Pike wrote the following article to

inform everyone about bullying:

'The word bullying means when somebody is being repeatedly hurt on purpose, by another individual or group. There are many different forms of

bullying including physical, verbal, cyber or online abuse and also mental. We think that one of the words people say can make you feel more hurt and insecure about yourself than anything else in the world. Getting beaten up can leave physical scars which can eventually heal, but hearing mean or hurtful comments can leave scars on a person's mental health that can last forever. This can affect people in lots of ways such as making them really emotional, shutting themselves away from the outside world, not talking to people, lacking motivation in school and even leading to depression. There are lots of things that can be done to stop bullying. Try not to be alone, because if you are alone less, people will tend not to target you. If you hang out with a close friend or friends, they can help to protect you and give you would support.

Speaking to someone about your feelings is also important. It can help to get things off your chest and get it sorted out so that you can feel like your normal self again. Talking to a trusted adult such as a parent, grandparent or teacher is a good start. They could also try and find out what the bully is going through, to help understand why this person is putting pressure on you. Sometimes people don't realise how bad or hurtful their actions are and the impact they have on other people either mentally, socially or physically.

There are lots of organisations that can offer advice and support about bullying or mental health issues. These include Childline, Anti-Bullying Alliance, Young Minds and Kooth. Joanne Sutterby Personal Development Subject Leader

C.E.A.S.E Youth Programme at KSGS
Since the start of the Autumn term, all Year 10 and 11 students have taken part in the C.E.A.S.E Youth Programme - which stands for 'Creating Empowerment and Self Efficacy'.

The aim of the C.E.A.S.E. programme is to help young people recognise the subtle indications of an abusive relationship and for them to have an understanding of the options available to them should they encounter or witness such behaviour.

The programme was delivered over four sessions to all students and took place during their timetabled Personal Development lessons. The programme was specifically centred around young people. Each session highlighted a number of behaviours and scenarios that constitute abuse within a teenage relationship. The workshops encouraged active dialogue within the group and used a number of different methods to provoke discussion. These included advert clips, handouts, statistics, music videos, newspaper articles and group brain storming.

The desired outcome of the C.E.A.S.E. programme was for young people to have an understanding of these key points

What you could do if you suspect or personally experience Domestic Abuse. Who you could talk to if you suspect or personally experience Domestic Abuse. Why a person cannot "just leave" an abusive relationship. Domestic Abuse is a behavioural choice on the perpetrators part.
