Year 8 Investigate Limestone LANDSCAPES AT Malham.

On Friday 10th June Year 8 Geographers escaped to the wilds of Malhamdale. Students carried out a range of activities to present their observations of the features of limestone landscapes and the processes responsible for them. They investigated the opportunities that the limestone creates for people and the impacts that the resulting tourism has on the environment and local economy. They also observed the role of The Yorkshire Dales National Park in managing tourism and its impacts to ensure that tourism is sustainable. Students were able to take advantage of the fair weather and walked to the base of the cove where they saw the rich variety of birds and wildlife and the people that this attracts, as well as the skilful climbers who were scaling the scar face. Having climbed the hundreds of steps built to aid the many visitors, they reached the impressive limestone pavements



and dry valleys made famous by featuring in the penultimate Harry Potter film. Although there was much huffing and puffing on the way up to the top of the cove it was agreed that the views were worth the effort. Students rewarded themselves with an ice cream at the local store back in the village of Malham. Your Mental Health matters to us at KSGS

What can affect our mental health negatively and positively?

What can we do to have positive mental health?

Who can we talk to if we are worried or need more information?

Who can we speak to in school?

Students listened attentively to the delivery, taking part in answering questions related to mental health and sharing some of their own concerns.

Following the workshop a permanent display of the information delivered, how to improve your mental health, and the help that students can access both within school and from outside agencies, was set up on a display board in the main school hall and outside the meeting room.

If someone had told me that I would have to live in the UK, I wouldn't have believed them. It's a lovely village with beautiful scenery, and amiable people. The air is so clean and here we can see different types of birds and animals. I like my school though it's not a Ukrainian one. I've been studying English from early age, that's why I can cope with it, though I'll still need help from my teachers here. I'm glad I can attend school here and make friends. When the war came to Kyiv on the 24th of February no one could believe that. It was morning time and we were going to have breakfast. Suddenly we heard powerful explosions not far away. The first thing which occurred to us was, we need to pack our suitcase and think of where to hide and then how to leave the coun-

First, we decided to go outside of Kyiv to my

Grandparents' house. We had to care for our pets, a dog and a cat. We were planning to stay there for a while as well, luckily there was a cellar where we could hide, it was very scary we had no water, no electricity no

heating, the nearest little shop was empty all we had was a supply of home preserved food which we had stored through the winter months. We realized we couldn't stay there any more, we decided to leave and walk to the nearest village where the local train station was. It was challenging to get out from there though it was very dangerous because time after time we would hear explosions, we were lucky to move here and now we feel safe, being away from the violence. I am happy living here in the UK away from the violence in Ukraine. When the war started in 2014, we were staying in Ukraine but now the war has come to every Ukraine city, so we had to flee the violence. My aunt has been living in the UK for a long time, so when she found out about the war she suggested we move to the UK. It didn't take long within two weeks the documents were complete and we moved here. My Uncle managed to find us some accommodation. My Mom got a job and my sister and I went to school. I've been studying English for a few years in Ukraine, but here I study all subjects in English, it is not easy but I try to do my best. My teachers are very helpful and I do appreciate what they do for me. Everything here is so different in comparison to my home city. The air is not polluted, the traffic is less, there are beautiful sceneries, there are different types of birds and animals, and everything is green. The weather is changeable here, it can be sunny in the morning and then raining in the afternoon, but I like it. It doesn't affect my mood. I miss Ukraine and my friends, but they all had to leave to flee the violence. Hopefully one day the war in the Ukraine will come to an end. Artur Kriepkyi Year 9

C.E.A.S.E Youth Programme at KSGS

During the summer term, all Year 9 students have taken part in the C.E.A.S.E Youth Programme - which stands for 'Creating Empowerment and Self Efficacy'. Carolyn Naseby and Harley Day came into school each week to deliver the 4 week programme, which had been devised by the charity Remedi UK. The aim of the C.E.A.S.E. programme is to help young people recognise the subtle indications of an abusive relationship, and for them to have an understanding of the options available to them should they encounter or witness such behaviour.

The desired outcome of the C.E.A.S.E. programme was for young people to have an understanding of these key points -

What you could do if you suspect or personally experience Domestic Abuse.

Who you could talk to if you suspect or personally experience Domestic Abuse.

Why a person cannot "just leave" an abusive relationship. Domestic Abuse is a behavioural choice on the perpetrators part.
