The 'Lessons from Auschwitz' project takes students on a 'journey of learning and exploration – about the history of the Holocaust and its relevance to today's world.' After an <u>introduction</u> seminar, the trip started by seeing the town of Oswiecim, which is more commonly known by the Germanised name Auschwitz, to experience the pre-war lives of the people who lived here. We then walked to the Great Synagogue Memorial Park, one of 20 Jewish sites of prayer in the town prior to WW2. Following the occupation of Oswiecim, the synagogue was set ablaze and destroyed by the Germans on the night of November 29th, 1939.

We then visited Auschwitz One where we observed shocking artefacts, including suitcases and shoes taken from people imprisoned in the camp. We were able to enter the first gas chamber, crematorium and see the execution wall; flowers, wreaths and other tributes had been laid in memorial.

After visiting the first camp we then proceeded to Auschwitz Birkenau. Barracks were reconstructed, with bunk beds and toilets, demonstrating the dire conditions of the camp. We then walked up the trainline to a memorial. Here, we listened to Rabbi Hackenbroch read out a prayer in Hebrew, listened to poetry about the Holocaust and all sang a hymn. To then commemorate the 6 million Jews that lost their lives due to Hitler and his collaborators, we lit candles and placed them across the memorial.

In order to reflect on our experience, we took part in a seminar. This was the most impactful part of the project as we were able to hear testimony from Holocaust survivor, Steven Frank BEM, who told us the story of his traumatic times in three camps from age seven. Steven's story was powerful, particularly as he himself did not identify as Jewish, but was recognised as a Jew due to his grandparent's religious expression.

As part of the project, we must complete the 'Next Steps' project. The purpose of this is to share our learning with others; to support this project, I have arranged for Holocaust survivor Janine Webber BEM to give her testimony to historians from Years 11, 12 and 13 on the 14th of December. STEM DAY

Late in the summer term the Science, IT and DT departments joined forces and arranged a STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths) Day for the whole of Year 8. The day was hosted by STEM DESIGN who delivered a series of 5 workshops for our students.

Molecules into Medicine

In this workshop students covered an introduction into atoms, molecules and compounds, understanding what different medicines are used for, building a series of molecules for different medical drugs, building a large molecule drug, and were all involved in a discussion around careers linked to biochemistry.

Practical Physics

This proved to be the most popular workshop of the day (for both staff and students). With students certainly warming to the tasks set, which included: reaction times using the batak board, forces in football, creating power through the rowing machine, and physics in sport.

Robotics

Our students programmed Lego robots around a maze, realising why accuracy was so important. They then joined in a conversation about how robotics are used in manufacturing, medicines and scientific research

Code Breaking

The students cracked a number of different codes to solve different clues to help them solve the puzzle. Students enjoyed using morse code, cyphers, pixel coding, and tangrams before hearing about careers and opportunities linked to coding.

Engineering – Tower Building

In the Tower Tournament we were all challenged to look at the work of structural engineers when building our own towers to take in the challenges of hurricane winds. We bought our resources, we built our towers against the clock, then tested our tours against our own hurricane winds (a fan). We concluded the session by looking at careers in engineering.

A fabulous day was had by all the students and staff involved, a day which would not have been possible without the support of other staff, The Foundation Governors and The Westmorland Foundation, and not forgetting of course Learn by Design who made it all such fun.





Year 8 NHS Careers Performance

On Friday 11th November, 'Performance In Education' visited KSGS to deliver an interactive drama based presentation about NHS careers to Year 8. Did you know there are over 350 different careers within the NHS? Students were also told about the different courses and pathways they could choose after their GCSE's including A-Levels, Apprenticeships, BTEC and T Levels.

Investigation Glacial Landforms and Processes in Easedale

On Thursday 3rd Nov Year 12 Geographers, accompanied by Mr Luke and myself, had a successful day exploring and investigating the glacial landforms of the Easedale Valley and applying their knowledge of the processes responsible for their development. Students walked to Easedale Tarn, sketching and explaining the glacial features and noting their spatial distribution. There's no substitute for getting outside into the landscapes as this really enables students to visualise these unfamiliar systems at work! A till fabric analysis of moraines at the fore of the corrie enabled students to hypothesise past glacier flow directions. Unfortunately, the rain didn't hold off, but this didn't dampen their spirits! Well done Year 12!

BRING IT ON In October Years 10 and 11 went to the Bring It On event held at the Beacon of Light in Sunderland. This was a fantastic event showcasing different STEM careers. There was a lot of information available about the different pathways into the careers, from apprenticeships at 16 to university degrees with a year in industry. It was a great opportunity for the students to meet people working for companies in the Industry, including Glaxo Smith Kline, Fujifilm and Atkins. It was a busy day with lots to see and do. Some of our students made it onto the tv channel live streaming the event! We all came away with lots of information, freebies and sweets. We were very fortunate to be able to attend the event as it is really only for schools in the North East. However, as there are so few events like this run in Cumbria Mrs Slack was able to convince the organisers to give us some tickets. Thank you Mrs Slack! We're hoping we will be able to go back next year.



VOLCANOES As part of their Hazards topic, Year 9 got creative and produced some outstanding 3D and 2D representations of real volcanoes. Having studied the structure of the earth and the physical different processes responsible for the origin of shield and strato volcanoes, they applied understanding to these projects. To access the highest grades, they were expected to demonstrate independent research into a volcano of their choice and reflect this in their models. A fantastic effort all round! Mrs Thompson.

EARTHQUAKES Having investigated the devastating impacts of earthquake events 9Z established that it's not earthquakes that kill people, its the buildings that do! They studied examples of 'earthquake proof buildings' in richer nations such as Japan and the USA. In response to this they set to applying the variety of building strategies to their own earthquake proof building designs in groups of four. This not only involved design ideas, but clear communication skill, collaboration and practical skills! Well Done Year 9 Mrs Thompson.

2022 KSGS Duke of Edinburgh Award **Expedition Presentations**

Well where do I start – it will have to be way back six years ago (2014) when we had a 6th Form Gold group, spearheaded by Aidan Wiseman and some very dynamic ladies – Amy Davis, Hannah Andrew, Martha Warren and Tessa Higgs and a young man called Thomas Metcalfe.

Below, at the ripe old age of 23 Thomas has completed his GOLD award and is preparing to go to London with a family member, meet royalty (Prince Edward) and claim his Gold Duke of Edinburgh Award, at Buckingham Palace, after starting it at KSGS. Congratulations Thomas.





Moving closer to 2022, I was approached by a very young James White Yr10 - enquiring if you could move from a Bronze award, directly to a Gold award. The answer was YES, but only after your 16th Birthday, so another dynamic KSGS group was formed.

They started off, pre Covid, in July 2021 we eventually got on our bikes for Expedition training, (without the element of camping), so we designed some challenging single days – 2 days skills and safety riding drills, a day in Eden and back to KSGS and a day in the Dales and home again. All did not start off right, as one of the 5 students tore his ligaments in his foot and had to drop out and on the second day of riding out in the Pennines, one of the students tested positive for Covid19 and the final day in the Dales had to be cancelled for everyone.

Most groups would have given up, however not James White, Jonathan Keetley, Molly Woodmass, and Matthew Dixon. They all completed their Gold Residential – a week away working as a volunteer for a charitable organisation, Volunteering, Skills and Physical – leaving their final Cycle expedition to the Hebrides, for a period after their final A Level exams in July 2022.

In brief they accomplished their GOLD expedition: Cycled over 300 miles

Caught 10 ferries and one train

Camped from their bikes for 8 nights

Journeyed round 4 islands and one peninsula – Arran, Kintyre Peninsula, Gigha, Islay and Jura

Interviewed and engaged with about 30 local residents with a survey -"Life in the Hebrides'

Endured some interesting weather

Visited only one distillery – the coffee shop!

Worked as a slick GOLD team

Finishing their time at KSGS with a memorable experience, that will sit with them for life. I am so proud of their accomplishments and they impressed the volunteer supervisors and assessors with their approach, achievements and sheer determination to succeed.

Grateful thanks to the Parish Council – Brittleton Award, KSGS Foundation Governors, Volunteer Supervisors/Assessors Andy Gillham and Martin Sansby and Bryan White for transporting the bikes. Finally a word about the outstanding parents who trusted the KSGS DofE programme and believed in their children, supporting them fully.

Moving onto the Bronze Expedition group – as usual there was a strong contingent who were trained, supervised, and assessed by volunteers from the Kirkby Stephen Mountain Team and support group.

Three groups were formed. Training took place at the Mountain Rescue Base and on the fells around Kirkby

Stephen over several weeks in the Spring, with the assessed expedition in the Lake District in June. The groups all planned and followed separate walking routes of around 25kms, starting at Coniston and meeting up again to camp in the beautiful Langdale Valley. They then continued their second day to finish at Langdale Ambleside Mountain Rescue base for a well-earned rest. Mike Sunderland
