Tuesday was a visit to the Caves in Nerja, which were impressive! Students linked this with their Geography learning about how limestone stalagmites, stalactites and caves are formed. This was followed by a VR presentation where it felt like you were

flying through the formation of the caves over thousands of years! The afternoon saw us returning to Torremolinos where we went to watch a traditional flamenco show.

On Wednesday we visited Málaga city centre. Students were spotting lots of words for shops that we had recently done in lessons and enjoyed the visit to the cathedral and the Picasso museum. Out final activity of the day was a visit to the Málaga bullring, where we had an excellent tour about the history and culture around this. Students also met a Matador (bullfighter) who showed the students how they 'dance' with the bulls and even had a go themselves with the capes.

Thursday was another full day of activities! After a visit to the beautiful Paloma Park in Benalmádena, we went to the port for a tapas lunch. All the students tried the different dishes or meatballs, squid and patatas bravas. We then had a visit to the Sealife Centre to learn about the marine life around the coast and in the wider world. An evening trip to the beach was enjoyed by everyone for a bit of paddling and sandcastle making!

On Friday we had a visit to Torremolinos centre for some last-minute souvenir shopping before heading home. It was a pleasure to take away such a lovely group of students who really got involved in all the different activities and learnt so much about Spanish culture. Y Vela-Castro

Year 9 Liverpool Trip

After arriving in Liverpool with Year 9 in good spirits, Mrs Sayers and Mrs Thompson from the Geography department led a walking tour from the Albert Dock leading up to different parts of the city centre to look at the regeneration of a major UK city. We walked through Liverpool One — one of the most successful regeneration projects undertaken in the UK, all the way up to Bold Street completing fieldwork on our way. We then visited the Chinese Arch and saw the impact of migration into Liverpool, on our way back to the centre students saw evidence of different transport

systems around and urban greening projects. Our aim was to see how the environment around us changed as we wandered through the

regenerated part of Liverpool and then into an area which has seen

substantial decline. This will help the students who have picked Geography for their GCSE. The students then enjoyed a little free time to explore Liverpool One and have their lunch before heading back down to the docks to the ferry terminal. The students enjoyed a cruise along the river whilst listening to historical commentary of the city, including its involvement in the slave trade and how it became an internal port for goods and people emigrating to America. They got a fantastic view of the waterfront and all the changes which have taken place including the new football stadium, cruise terminal (with a vast ship in it with water slides) and M+S Arena.

Sunday dawned bright and sunny, and the weather remained dry until midafternoon, when a few showers started. The groups made their way over and



Year 8 Investigate Limestone LANDSCAPES AT Malham

On Friday 13th June Year 8 geographers escaped to the wilds of Malhamdale. Students carried out a range of activities to present their observations of the features of limestone landscapes and the processes responsible for them. They investigated the opportunities that the limestone creates for people and the impacts that the resulting tourism has on the environment and local economy. They also observed the role of The Yorkshire Dales National Park in managing tourism and its impacts to ensure that tourism is sustainable. Students were able to take advantage of the fair weather and walked to the base of the cove where they saw the rich variety of birds and wildlife and the people that this attracts, as well as the skilful climbers who were scaling the scar face. Having climbed the hundreds of steps built to aid the many visitors, they reached the impressive limestone pavements and dry valleys made famous by featuring in the penultimate Harry Potter film. Although there was much huffing and puffing on the way up to the top of the cove it was agreed that the views were worth the effort. Students rewarded themselves with an ice cream at the local store back in the village of Malham. Year 12 Students Take Part in Forensic DNA Workshop at the Centre for Life

Our Year 12 students also recently visited the Centre for Life in Newcastle for a fascinating forensic DNA workshop. During the session, they learned how scientists use DNA analysis to solve crimes and bring evidence to life.

Students had the opportunity to use specialist equipment as part of a hands-on activity involving gel electrophoresis. They compared DNA fingerprints from three suspects against a sample found at a crime scene to determine which individual might have committed the crime. This practical experience gave them valuable insight into the techniques and tools used in real forensic investigations.

The workshop provided a unique chance for Year 12 students to apply their classroom knowledge in a real-world context, deepening their understanding of biology and forensic science.

Year 10 First Aid Training Our Year 10 students participated in CPR (CardiopulmonaryResuscitation) training session designed to equip them with life-saving skills. The session was conducted by qualified instructors from First Responders.

The training covered essential CPR techniques, including how to recognise cardia arrest, call for emergency help and perform chest compressions.

Students also had the opportunity to practice on mannequins, allowing them to gain hands-on experience and confidence in delivering effective CPR.

In addition to practical training, students learned about the importance of using a Defibrillator and how to operate one safely.

All students were fully engaged and actively joined in.


